March. Month three. The perfect time to consider Tradition Three: "The only requirement for AA membership is a desire to stop drinking."

Tradition Three is the only one of the Twelve Traditions to be included, verbatim, in the preamble we read at the beginning of every meeting.

Here it is in its long form: "Our membership ought to include all who suffer from alcoholism. Hence we may refuse none who wish to recover. Nor ought AA membership ever depend on money or conformity. Any two or three alcoholics gathered together for sobriety may call themselves an AA group, provided that, as a group, they have no other affiliation."

Arriving at this beautifully simple Tradition was anything but easy. Back in the day, the General Service Office [then called the Foundation office] asked groups to provide their lists of "protective" regulations regarding memberships and, as the **Twelve and Twelve** points out, if all those regulations had been in effect, nobody could possibly have joined AA.

Our membership ought to include all who suffer from alcoholism. Hence we may refuse none who wish to recover."

Here's a story...NOT in the **Twelve and Twelve**...that offers a painful taste of what could happen in the days of AA before the Traditions were put in place. Norma Livoni showed up at the doors of AA in Los Angeles sometime in 1941. She got sober, got a sponsor, got a job, and got an apartment. Then just before Pearl Harbor day, a group of the members of her home group [keep in mind that at that time there were only a few meetings in the whole state of California] took it upon themselves to send Irma a letter. Here it is:

Dear Mrs. Livoni:

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Los Angeles Group of Alcoholics Anonymous, held Dec. 4th, 1941, it was decided that your attendance at group meetings was no longer desired until certain explanations and plans for the future were made to the satisfaction of the committee. This action has been taken for reasons that should be most apparent to yourself. It was decided that, should you so desire, you may appear before members of this committee and state your attitude. This opportunity will be afforded you between now and December 15th, 1941. You may communicate with us at the above address by that date. In case you do not wish to appear, we shall consider this matter closed and that your membership is terminated.

It is stunning to read the letter now. And, happily, difficult to imagine such a letter being written today. As the **Twelve and Twelve** tells us, AA groups at that time were fragile and there was great fear that "something or somebody would capsize the boat and dump us all back in the drink." We all know well from the **Twelve and Twelve** the stories of Ed the Atheist and the man with the so-called "double stigma" and Bill W. hearing, again and again in his heart the question about admitting or not admitting someone: "What would the Master do?" So after years of what the **Twelve and Twelve** calls "harrowing experience," the principle of membership that became Tradition Three was formed.

Fast forward to today: we read Tradition Three in our preamble. We discuss it in Traditions meetings. But might it not be useful from time to time for a group to do an informal...or formal if it so wishes..."Only Requirement" inventory?

Are we as a group doing anything, by design or by accident that appears to be a requirement of member-

ship beyond the desire to stop drinking? Do we sometimes, unwittingly, expect or demand that "conformity" that the long form of this Tradition tells us membership does **not** depend upon? Here's an example that may at first blush seem small or even silly but it does make a point: how many of us have been in a meeting at which someone starts to share or read and does not say his or her name or identify as an alcoholic and a member suddenly interrupts loudly with, "Who are you?" Are we as a group inter-

ested in knowing each other's names? Of course. But should we be interrupting folks to make them say their names? Is it helpful for us to identify as alcoholics? Yes. But is there a *requirement* that anyone ever say his or her name or identify as an alcoholic? Nope.

Our home group, "Attitude Adjustment" in Bend, recently chose to make a slight but important adjustment to our meeting format so that anytime the meeting secretary or meeting leader invites the members to say a prayer, we now preface it with, "If you care to..." or "Will those who care to..." We believe that no one should feel they are somehow less than full members if they don't want to pray.

Our group, through an exercise of its conscience at a recent business meeting, decided, as individual members and not through any attempt to impose some formal rule [who dislikes "rules" more than a bunch of alcoholics?], to stop "chanting" at meetings...things like:

"God could and would if he were sought"

"...place principles before personalities"

"Keep coming back, it works if you work it"

A formal group inventory a number of months back had helped us focus on this "chanting" business and we learned from a number of folks, some new and some not so new, that all the chanting was making people uncomfortable because it could threaten to lend meetings the [unintended] atmosphere of a cult, leaving new members feeling that they were somehow *required* to chime in on the chanting, as uncomfortable as it might make them.

AA groups, we are reminded in our **Fourth** Tradition, enjoy marvelous autonomy. If a group wants to chant, wants to say seven prayers...or none, wants to do five readings at each meeting...or none...it is free to do so. But the letter and spirit of the Third Tradition mean the group also needs to exercise its autonomy with care so that its members, especially newcomers, can easily understand that their membership in AA in no way depends on their participation in or conformity to the group's practices and that their membership requires one thing and one thing only: a desire to stop drinking.

TAKE FIVE ALIVE

An Open Letter from Chris N., DCM, District No. 5

Hello to all,

My name is Chris N and I am an alcoholic. I am presently serving as DCM (District Committee Member) for District No. 5. I replaced Doris T. who rotated out in September. Thanks and kudos to Doris for her devoted service. Thanks to all the trusted servants who helped this anxious and self-doubting alcoholic feel welcome in a new service position (that fear thing is getting better but it's not gone yet.)

Bill Wilson and Dr. Bob left us with three legacies in AA. They are written on most of the coins that we present to members to commemorate periods of continuous sobriety. They are Recovery, Unity, and Service. Service is giving back to the fellowship that which has been so freely given to us. It takes many forms – 12 Step calls, chairing meetings, acting as a group secretary or treasurer and volunteering for the AA Hot line are a few. General service is standing for a position in the general service structure such as a committee chair, Group GSR (General Service Representative) or DCM to name a few. All of these service positions work in tandem to assure that the fellowship will remain functioning, stable, and available for us and for the still suffering alcoholic. You might be wondering how a fellowship of unstable drunks is capable of accomplishing this feat. It truly is miraculous. We have successfully been doing just that for decades. Amazing, isn't it?! The tools that we use are the 12 Steps, 12 Traditions and the 12 Concepts for World Service. The Tradi-

Some of these conflicts were serious enough to threaten the continued existence of AA. The 12 Steps protect us from drink and the 12 Traditions and Concepts protect us from each other!

In order for AA to function, decisions have to be made. The question remains. How can a group of self-centered, self-serving, egotistical, mentally and spiritually challenged alcoholics agree on anything? The answer is slowly and with great difficulty. Yet it is done successfully and the spiritual growth of the fellowship is a wonderful by-product. Business meetings of groups that are not grounded in the Steps, Traditions and Concepts often result in chaos, argument and resentments. Some of these resentments can result in a trip back to the bottle or dissolution of the group. Cries of the perils of AA politics come up. Many AAs shun general service for this reason. The fact is that if the Steps, Traditions and Concepts are employed the politics can be completely avoided and service remains. It is part of the miracle.

You might ask yourself what is "in it" for me (as this self-serving alcoholic did). I can only speak for myself but others that I have had the pleasure to meet in general service tell a very similar story. General service has greatly improved the quality of my sobriety. One of the main reasons that I drank was fear and the inability to get along with my fellow human beings. To live life on life terms was too much for me to handle. Alcohol made my life bearable for a while but ultimately let me down. I have served in general service for over four years, as Alternate GSR,

GSR, and now DCM. I have worked with a service sponsor in addition to Step work with my AA program sponsor. I have come to see that people who have been involved in general service consistently over time have the promises come through for them in spades!

The promises don't come automatically. They are conditional! The promises begin and end with qualifying statements. The first is "If we are painstaking in this phase of our development we will be amazed before we are half way through" (pain being the touchstone of spiritual growth). The second is that the promises will always come true "if we work for them". To discuss and problem solve while practicing the principles of love, tolerance and acceptance is a challenge. Service work consistently puts our trusted servants in those challenging situations. They have countless opportunities to practice the AA program and spiritual principals and they can grow personally and

spiritually as a result of the practice.

Even though began my service complete any

I had some fear when I work, I found I could needed task in the com-

pany of alcoholics that have been where I have been and have felt like I feel. I have learned by example from people who have been in service before me. I also listen to how other groups and districts have dealt with challenging circumstances and situations (both successfully and unsuccessfully). There is no need to reinvent the wheel if I can take to heart and employ others "experience strength and hope".

The overall result is that faith in the process grows. The members of the fellowship grow stronger as their bonds with one another solidify. It is true that the purpose of general service is to perform the business of AA. Yet the importance of reaching a decision pales in comparison with the growth of the members as a result of trusting and engaging in the process. To put it plainly, it is more about the journey and less about the destination.
