## Some History of AA Chips



The traditions of chips, medallions and birthdays vary in different parts of the country and I thought it would be interesting to present some of their history.

There is evidence that early on many people in AA carried personal mementos to remind themselves of the importance of their sobriety. Clarence H. Snyder - The Home Brewmeister had his last drink on February 11, 1938 and he carried this medallion made from a silver dollar and a watchfob up until just before his death on March 22, 1984. It has been dated back into the mid-1940's, if not before, and the holes represent 46 years of sobriety. Clarence started AA group #3 in Cleveland in 1939, and in the beginning had a higher recovery rate than Bill and Dr. Bob combined. His story, "Home Brewmeister", can be found on page 297 of the Big Book.

Sister Ignatia, the nun who helped Dr. Bob get the hospitalization program started at St. Thomas Hospital in Akron was the first person to use medallions in Alcoholics Anonymous. She gave the drunks who were leaving St. Thomas after a five day dry out a Sacred Heart Medallion and instructed them that the acceptance of the medallion signified a commitment to God, to A.A. and to recovery and that if they were going to drink, they had a responsibility to return the medallion to her before drinking. The sacred heart medallions had been used prior to A.A. by the Father Matthew Temperance Movement of the 1840's and the Pioneers, an Irish Temperance Movement of the 1890's.

The practice of giving sobriety chips in A.A. is attributed to a Group in Elmira, N.Y. in 1947. The celebration of birthdays came from the Oxford Group where they celebrated the anniversary of their spiritual rebirth. People in early A.A. chose the anniversary of the date of their last drink.

Early celebrations of birthdays resulted in people getting drunk and Dr. Harry Tiebout was asked to look at the problem and he commented on this phenomenon in an article titled "When the Big "I" Becomes Nobody", (AAGV, Sept. 65):

"Early on in A.A., I was consulted about a serious problem plaguing the local group. The practice of celebrating a year's sobriety with a birthday cake had resulted in a certain number of the members getting drunk within a short period after the celebration. It seemed apparent that some could not stand prosperity. I was asked to settle between birthday cakes or no birthday cakes. Characteristically, I begged off, not from shyness but from ignorance. Some three or four years later, A.A. furnished me the answer. The group no longer had such a problem because, as one member said, "We celebrate still, but a year's sobriety is now a dime a dozen. No one gets much of a kick out of that anymore."

The A.A. Grapevine carried many articles on chips and cakes and the following is a brief summary of some.

Feb. 1948 - Why All the Congratulations? "When we start taking bows (even on anniversaries) we bow ourselves right into the cuspidor."

July, 1948 - Group To Give Oscar for Anniversaries. The Larchmont Group of Larchmont, N.Y. gives a cast bronze camel mounted on a mahogany base to celebrate 1st., 5th and 10th anniversaries. "The camel is wholly emblematic of the purposes of most sincere A.A.s, i.e., to live for 24 hours without a drink."

August 1948 - The Artesia, N.Mex. Group awards marbles to all members. If you are caught without your marbles, you are fined 25 cents. This money goes into the Foundation Fund.

June 1953 - We operate a poker chip club in the Portland Group (Maine). We have poker chips of nine colors of which the white represents the probation period of one month. If he keeps his white chip for one month he is presented with a red chip for one month's sobriety. The chips continue with blue for two months, black for three, green for four, transparent blue for five, amber for six, transparent purple for nine months and a transparent clear chip for one year. We have our chips stamped with gold A.A. letters. Also at the end of the year and each year thereafter, we present them with a group birthday card signed by all members present at the meeting.

January 1955 - Charlotte, N.C. "When a man takes "The Long Walk" at the end of a meeting, to pick up a white chip, he is admitting to his fellow men that he has finally accepted the precepts of A.A. and is beginning his sobriety. At the end of three months he exchanges his white chip for a red one. Later, a handsome, translucent chip of amber indicates that this new member has enjoyed six months of a new way of life. The nine month chip is a clear seagreen and a blue chip is given for the first year of sobriety. In some groups a sponsor will present his friend with an engraved silver chip, at the end of five years clear thinking and clean living.

March 1956 - The One Ton Poker Chip. Alton, Illinois. Author gave friend a chip on his first day eight years ago (1948) and told him to accept it in the spirit of group membership and that if he wanted to drink to throw the chip away before starting drinking.

October 1956 - Bangor Washington. Article about a woman who sits in a bar to drink, the bartender sees her white chips and asks what it is. She tells him. He throws her out as he does not want an alcoholic in his bar. She calls friend.

April 1957 - Cape Cod, Mass. Group recognizes 1st, 5th and 15th anniversaries. Person celebrating leads meeting. Person is presented with a set of wooden carved plaques with the slogans.

July 1957 - New Brunswick, Canada. Birthday Board.

Member contributes one dollar for each year of sobriety

July 1957 - Oregon. Person is asked to speak and is introduced by his or her sponsor. The wife, mother, sister or other relative brings up a cake. The Group sings Happy Birthday. The wife gives a two or three minute talk.

April 1959 - Patterson, N.J. People are asked to give "three month pin talks."

# TAKE FIVE ALIVE

## Does District Five Have Excess Funds!?



There has been a lot of spirited discussion lately that there are excess funds in District 5. Spirited discussion is a very good thing. I have shared this with other DCMs (District committee members), GSRs (General Service representatives) and a host of other trusted servants at our quarterly service assemblies and the recent Pacific Region Alcoholics Anonymous Service Assembly. The overwhelming response to this sharing was that many other districts and areas were not blessed with such a

**quality problem!** Take note that the representatives who shared this with the fellowship at Area Service assemblies or PRAASA were fully or partially funded to attend the above mentioned service events using their own funds! This is not unusual. Some of the most informative and helpful aids to avoiding situations and circumstances that may threaten the continued existence of AA are the GSR, DCM sharing sections/roundtables and

The Past Delegate “Ask it Basket.” I have been to these events for the past 4½ years and have seen at least 5 past delegates in attendance. These events are a regular agenda item of our quarterly AA service assemblies. This is where combined experiences, strengths and hopes are shared so that AA does not have to regularly re-invent the wheel or place itself in the middle of controversy that has in the past threatened to tear AA apart. Our greatest threats are not from without but within the fellowship. There is abundant evidence of this in AA history as recorded in: Dr. Bob and the Good Old Timers/Pass It On/AA Comes of Age and the development of our 12 Traditions as described in Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions. Attendance at service events is facilitated by the Seventh Tradition funds of the Group, District or Area. The Groups, Districts and Areas that do not share District 5’s problems of abundance have partially or fully funded their representatives to attend these various AA service assemblies. *This is how they used their excess funds!* Here is my main point:

***The only reason that we have excess funds is that we are not making sufficient use of them within our own district to further our Twelfth step work.*** (Tradition Five.)

There is another effective use of our Seventh Tradition funds. There are monies available for the funding of workshops within the District. Last year we had an event of this type. District 5 funded a workshop on “Sponsorship.” It was held to a standing room only crowd. How did this come about? Attitude Adjustment group expressed an interest in having the District produce a workshop on sponsorship and the District did just that. At the District/GSR meeting it was suggested that the GSR of the group that requested the workshop chair the committee. He had no experience in this area and it allowed him a true opportunity for growth. At the last

District meeting the GSR of the WFS group requested a workshop be held that would help clarify the duties and responsibilities of the various service positions within the District. Again, it was decided that this was a great idea.

How can you personally become involved in the most constructive use of these funds? To begin with, the District is not some nebulous outside entity whose responsibility is to fulfill the needs of AA. And the definition of DCM is “An experienced GSR elected by other GSRs to represent the groups of their District in area committee meetings and to coordinate service activities in the District.” (AA service manual from CONFERENCE LANGUAGE p. S18. Further, some of the duties of a DCM is: “Organizes workshops and/or sharing sections on service activities.” (AA service manual, p. S30 DCM Duties.)

The District needs its members (that means us) to step up and give back what was freely given us. There are monies and organizational experience to assist you for the asking. Ask your DCM and GSR for help. Do them a service, utilize them. Involve other groups and request them to assist. This is a WE program. This is a program of action, our action. The members that put on these workshops and service events will grow due to the necessity of working with others with patience, tolerance and open mindedness.

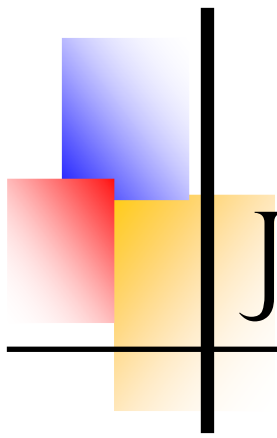
If you care to contribute to the self support of AA have a heart to heart with your higher power and please bring you body, mind and (most important) spirit to the next District meeting. It is held at Trinity Episcopal Church, Wall Street, Bend at 4:00 the second Sunday of every month. Among other topics that will be discussed are the funding of GSRs and committee chairs to attend AA service events. Your input and service is needed to assure that doors of AA remain open for the alcoholic who presently still suffers and the one that has not been born yet.

The Seventh Tradition goes beyond simple monetary donations. Our own contributions of time and effort both in attendance and preparation for AA service events are invaluable. Passing on the “informed group conscience” to other AAs in the fellowship is part of our Primary Purpose. It is through knowledge and utilization of the AA Steps, Traditions and Concepts for world service that an “informed group conscience” is reached. Bill Wilson and Dr. Bob Smith left three legacies to AA. They are: Recovery, Unity and Service. If you or your group is not involved in General Service you are missing out on one-third of the program. Those AA members or groups not contributing their time, energy and expertise are requiring other members and groups to field the responsibility of developing AA growth. Stay in the middle of the herd and live sober!
