

## I Could Not Do It On My Own

I was raised in South Minneapolis in a Christian, nondrinking home. There was no alcoholism in my family. I guess there is a first time for everything. My parents did not drink, there was never alcohol in my home and there was never any alcohol at family events. Apparently I was bound and determined to change that. I never drank during High School. I was a champion wrestler so I took care of myself. But after graduation I became a binge drinker. I thought "that is what you were supposed to do with alcohol, party until you puke." I did much of that. My first drunk was on wine, and after being sick for several days. I vowed to never do that again. After a few weeks of not drinking I felt better, so I went out and did it again! That would set up my behavior for my just-developing drinking career.

I learned from treatment about denial patterns, and mine were minimizing, comparing, and flight into health. I never got a DUI, I was never fired nor told I would be fired if I did not quit drinking, I never went through a divorce nor did I have many of the problems associated with alcohol abuse. I was just flat lucky. I did get into some scrapes because of alcohol abuse, so I would quit drinking completely for three to nine months and then convince myself it was ok to drink again. I would drink somewhat responsibly for a period of time and then my drinking would deteriorate into binge drinking. I would wake up with a hangover and drink to alleviate the symptoms. If one beer was good two must be better and that would lead to four and that would lead to six and then 12. This would go on for a few days and then I would quit, go through several days of self detoxification then when I felt better I would decide to try drinking again; I always told myself that *this time* it would be different. My behavior was the true definition of insanity: Doing the same thing over and over again expecting a different result. My efforts always ended in failure.

I had known about Alcoholics Anonymous from the church I attended in Minneapolis. The pastor counseled alcoholics. Many members of the church were in recovery and would come and talk to our high school classes. I listened to their stories and then say to myself: *this will never happen to me*. Because of this influence, at least I knew where to find help if and when I was ready to quit for real. After about 12 years of drinking I finally had enough and found an AA meeting to go to. There were several

people my age in the group as well as the Old Guard. I sobered up, kept going to meetings and found a good church to attend. It was in the church where I met and married my wife. We were blessed with three children and had a great sober life together. Then in November of 1987, my wife was diagnosed with cancer. It was fourth stage and there was no cure. She fought and lived until September 2, 1988. We were together right up to the very end.

When the cancer patient dies it is a relief. The cancer patient is finally out of pain, and the family is finally over the emotional and financial burden that long term illness brings. All of the stages of the grieving process have been gone through, the healing process begins, and now life can go on. I was looking forward to the challenge and blessing of raising my daughter and two sons. Then on September 29, 1988, just 27 days after my wife's death, my 11 year old daughter was killed by a classmate in a shooting accident. That goes beyond explanation. People who had been so supportive and loving during my wife's long illness and death now turned away in shock and horror. My attitude about life went from enthusiasm to the depths of despair. There was no explaining this or ever getting over it.

I did not go back to drinking right away, although nobody would have blamed me if I did. I had two boys to take care of. One was five yeas old and the other not yet two years old. I would come home at night after work and my two boys would climb on my lap and just cling to me. We would sit and zone out in front of the TV. After about a year they got too big and we no longer fit in the chair, so those times became less and less. I began dating and socializing. It was not long before I decided I was boring to be around so I began drinking again. Nobody told me I was boring, it was just an excuse to start drinking again. Eventually my previous drinking patterns began to re-emerge. I would awaken with a minor hangover and decide to finish off the one or two beers in the refrigerator.

I would fall asleep and wake up with a worse hangover so I would go out and get more alcohol. My drinking pattern soon became that of drinking, passing out, waking up and drinking some more. Again my denial patterns of minimizing, comparing and flight into health came into play. I again convinced myself that I was not as bad as the other guy, I never got into trouble or was questioned about my drinking and I still participated in a hard core exercise program. There were many times while on a drunk I would look at myself in the mirror and tell myself I was an alcoholic and needed to get help. A few days later I felt better and convinced my self I was not really an alcoholic and that the next time would be different.

This insane, stubborn behavior went on for many years. I prayed to God to give me strength to get help. With the strength that He gave me I checked into a treatment center. I have been sober for two years now, thanks to the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous and Celebrate Recovery. I have many new friends and it still amazes me to see so many smiling, happy people at a 7:00 AM meeting. After the meeting I join other attendees for coffee at a local coffee shop. This meeting after the meeting runs the gamut from serious deliberation to out and out gut busting laughter. I am sure that at times we may be disruptive to the other patrons but now it is out of sobriety not drunkenness. I am a very happily married man and feel blessed to have a sober, supportive wife. I have been restored to my two sons. Sobriety is great, life is good, an attitude of acceptance has healed me and taking life one day at a time works.

## **ARCHIVES AND HISTORY**



"We are trying to build up extensive records which will be of value to a future historian...

"It is highly important that the factual material be placed in our files in such a way that there can be no substantial distortion...

"We want to keep enlarging on this idea for the sake of the full length history to come..."

— Bill W., 1957

The idea for organizing an historical collection of the Fellowship's records came from A.A. co-founder Bill W. in the early 1950s. Bill was becoming increasingly concerned that "the history of Alcoholics Anonymous is still veiled in the deep fog." Knowing that the office correspondence was loosely maintained in the drawers at the General Headquarters, he set out to arrange our historical records.

He personally recorded oldtimers' recollections in the Akron/Cleveland area; he sent out boxes of blank tapes to others, encouraging them to record their recollections. Bill's far-reaching vision outlined an archival message that is still sound today. As he said: "Every one of the new and unexpected developments (in A.A.) has, lying just underneath, an enormous amount of dramatic incident and experience—stories galore.... It isn't hard to prepare a fact sheet of what happened—that is, dates when people came in, groups started and so forth. The hard thing to lay hold of is the atmosphere of the whole proceedings and anecdotal material that will make the early experience alive."

After many decades of tireless organizing and arranging, the G.S.O. Archives room was opened with a formal ribbon-cutting ceremony in November 1975.

Since then, the G.S.O. archivists and the trustees serving on the Archives Committee of the General Service Board have encouraged the importance of archival service, which is vital to the survival of the Fellowship. As a result of that work, today almost all areas have set up archival collections, and there is a significant growth at the district level.

Historical records help us to sift through our day-to-day experience in recovery and reach back for the shared experience from the past. As we sort out the myth from the facts, we ensure that our original message of recovery, unity and service remains the same in a changing, growing, expanding Fellowship that constantly renews itself.




## Calling All Old-Timers!!!!!!

Perhaps he is pleased with our disorganized efforts and makes things right no matter who pushes the wrong buttons. \*\*\* Maybe God is pleased with our simple yet sincere efforts to do what's right for us and others. Maybe he is pleased with our trying to be nobody but ourselves. We don't know how it works, but it does, and members keep receiving their dividend checks from their AA investments.

It is wise to be sober, and it is much easier, my friends, to stay sober than it is to get sober.
