

Whether 'tis Nobler in the Mind

As I was walking up the stair I met a man who wasn't there He wasn't there again today Oh how I wish he'd go away



This little rhyme from childhood echoes in my head and continually summons watchfulness when I think about alcohol, alcoholism and even my passage to recovery.

It stirs in me the long ago memories of nights I cannot recall no matter if I scream or whisper for their return. It calls attention to my fear that there are phantoms lurking on my doorstep which causes me to look over my shoulder often – especially in my dreams.

It admonishes me about the years I wasted pushing life away wallowing in total denial about my drinking. I would convince myself – "Of course my problems were not in any way related to my drinking – my drinking gives me a reprieve from my very difficult circumstances and how unfair it all is, et cetera, et cetera..."

Oh what a tangled web of deceit and denial I was able to weave.

It revives in me the truth that alcohol is cunning and baffling and will haunt me forever; that alcoholism is a disease that must be confronted, fought and overcome – with help – on a daily basis. The man who isn't there still causes my skin to crawl with dread at his presence.

Pretty powerful little rhyme I'd say.

Box 459 New York, NY 10164-0371 I spent most of my life as a norm-y. Didn't drink until college where I did do some binge drinking – but mostly in safe places with friends. After college I began my new life and career. My work was quite demanding – lots of clients – lots of travel – but never a problem delivering projects and programs, running strategic meetings and writing marketing plans – it was after work that I was expected to entertain the clients and make sure they all were safe and back in their hotel rooms so we could do it all again the next day. I usually drank with them but had to keep my wits about me because I was responsible for paying the bills and my boss would kill me if I lost one of my clients. When I was home - I drank at ball games and after participating in club sports. I would usually have a drink before dinner and sometimes a glass of wine – but rarely if ever - finished a bottle of wine on my own.

I was able to maintain this "norm-y" status even through the death of my father when I was 29, the death of my mother at 39, my divorce at 39 and 4 job changes. And then – I don't know why – somehow, something shifted in my nature and in my soul. I now entered a dark domain of anger and doubt – of unfulfilled expectations and resentments, of deciding the world and everyone in it owed me something for all my hard work and suffering. I was also lonely, tired and sad.

The job that coincided with this shift required quite a bit of drinking – especially with my boss and because of him (or so I firmly believed). By this time I was a gold flyer on many airlines and had been to every major city in the US at least once. I was familiar with about 80% of the Airline Board Rooms around the country. I discovered much to my delight – that I could drink for free for hours on the ground, when upgraded and while I traversed the country. Unfortunately, one day after throwing up in garbage cans in the airports of Portland, Chicago, and DC – all in one day - I began thinking there might be a problem.

The next day, my hands were shaking so badly I could not even control the mouse on my computer to run through a PowerPoint presentation. I chalked it up to low blood sugar. As my protective shields and excuses began to disintegrate it became desperately apparent that I needed help.

I found AA. I could not afford a Treatment Center. At my wits end, I walked into the basement of a church in the early morning of a sunny brisk day and found a refuge. Serendipity had escorted me, providence provided the map, and sparkling points of illumination -those already acquainted with the sunlight of the spirit – welcomed me with open arms. I think they had been expecting me. I was plucked by the chords of authenticity - of the genuine people and the simplicity of the message. They showed me how I could open the gateway towards hope, with a continued journey to health, a renewed spirituality, and just plain life on life's terms.

AA is the most remarkable organization I have ever encountered or had the good fortune to be a part of. I am awe-struck by the warmth, the welcoming, and the forgiveness that shines inside the rooms. The relief I felt just knowing there were more people who were just like me, who suffered the same character defects, who had also been pummeled by the disease of alcoholism. I was among friends and compatriots. They taught me that willingness is the key to begin – and my Higher Power will be my guide – not only through recovery to alcoholism but to repairing and retrieving my soul.

Perhaps they have also seen the man who isn't there.

I close with a quote from Shakespeare's Hamlet – somehow it brings to mind our human condition, the courage and the strength we at AA bring to each other as we all face the same question.....

Whether 'tis nobler in the mind to suffer the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune,
Or to take arms against a sea of troubles, and by opposing, end them.

I wasted enough of my life suffering the slings and arrows of resentment, self-pity and self-doubt. With the help of my higher power and AA - I have been given the courage and fortitude to oppose my demons – and at least for today – end them.

What are the origins of the Serenity Prayer?

It was debated for years who wrote the Serenity Prayer, and its origins are still somewhat murky, but it seems most likely to have been written by Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr, a well-known theologian who served for many years as Dean and Professor of Applied Christianity at the Union Theological Seminary in New York City. G.S.O.'s Archives can provide more information about this prayer's historical origins upon request.

Alcoholics Anonymous became aware of the Serenity Prayer in 1941, when it was discovered printed in the New York Tribune newspaper. Ruth Hock, AA's first secretary and a non-alcoholic, was immediately taken with it. The headquarters staff thought of printing the prayer on a card to distribute to AA members.

On June 12, 1941, Ruth wrote Henry S., a Washington, D.C.-based AA member and printer by profession, saying:

"One of the boys up here got a clipping from a local newspaper which is so very much to the point and so much to their liking, that they have asked me to find out from you what it would cost to set it up on a small card, something like a visiting card, which can be carried in a wallet... here it is...would appreciate it if you would let me know right away."

Henry answered back immediately and enthusiastically:

"...Your cards are on the way and my congratulations to the man who discovered that in the paper. I can't recall any sentence that packs quite the wallop that that does and during the day shown it to the A.A.'s that dropped in and in each case have been asked for copies. I sent you 500 copies in as much as you didn't say how many you wanted. If you need any more, let me know. Incidentally, I am only a heel when I'm drunk, I hope, so naturally there could be no charge for anything of this nature."

Ruth responded again on June 17, and wrote:

"Your generous response to my request for the little cards is certainly much appreciated by us all up here. Glad so many of you down there liked it too, for it backs me up in my feeling that it really has 'something."


