



I have found that we are all meant to do something in AA, but no one is meant to do EVERYTHING. :) It took me a while to figure this out.

Turns out my specific piece of the big AA puzzle would be the Traditions?? WHO KNEW!!?! NOT ME!

When I first came in, if I would accidentally show up at a Traditions study, I would just straight up turn around and leave. But NOT before telling you WHY I was leaving and who's fault it was.

When I started to observe how things work in AA, I was sure I would be a speaker. I couldn't read, or write... Plus, I love attention! I always have. I was always the class clown. The trouble maker. Rule breaker... Very social. I thought for sure my role was going to be telling my story. (Talking about myself) BOY DID GOD HAVE OTHER PLANS!

I NEVER guessed I would be the briefcase packing, pamphlet pushing, AA geek who can tell you where in our literature to find the answer to almost any question you have about our 12 Traditions. Ewww! What?? But, I failed history, got kicked out of high-school, and the only book I ever read in my life before AA, was "Ramona the Great" in 3rd grade!

Well, in the beginning, I DID start speaking. Actually quite a bit. I can be very entertaining, (and inappropriate) and that's what people liked. I was very "popular" in my local fellowship. Everyone loved me. I was invited to every party, BBQ, social event... I was invited to speak at every meeting. By the time I was 2 years sober/dry, I was behind the podium almost every week. I'm not going to lie, I LOVED IT.

I started working with a new sponsor (the sponsor I have now). As I got further into the steps with her, into the Big Book, and started learning about the Traditions, a perfect storm occurred. I had a spiritual awakening as the result of the steps, was in just enough self inflicted pain and had fallen in love with Alcoholics Anonymous. I had started to see through the inventory process that my behavior, my motives, the way I carry the message in AA, was very self-serving and NOT in alignment with what I had begun learning about the Traditions.

I tried to ignore it the best I could (that pesky conscience), but my road was becoming narrower whether I liked it or not. I started to hear things come out of my mouth from the podium, things that I had said dozens of times before, but that didn't feel right anymore. And in fact, things that were so extremely opposed to what I was learning, that I started choking on my words while speaking. I couldn't even get words out before long. I started to stutter during my talks. MAJOR STUTTERS, then nothing would come out at all. I realized I had almost nothing to say that was in alignment with the 2nd set of spiritual principles.

By the time I was on my 8th step, it had become clear that ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS should be on that list. I had been grossly disrespecting and even abusing the very fellowship that saved



my life!

I was at a crossroads. A dead stop at a crossroad.

Continues.....

As I sat there with my sponsor that day, as she looked across the table at me, right into my eyes, we both knew it was time for me to make a choice. I could either continue down the path of popularity - being wanted and loved by all in AA. The path my ego was screaming at me to take. It would still be doable to just stop learning anymore about the Traditions and go back to blissful ignorance. *OR*, I could listen to my Higher Power's very clear message and for the first time in my sobriety, in my life, make a choice to do God's will, and NOT my own.

I would like to say this was an easy decision for me :(It was not! I have a STRONG WILL and I like doing what feels good. My sponsor reassured me that she would support me in whatever choice I made, but that we both knew I had a decision to make. She told me to go home, pray about it and make my choice after some prayerful consideration. I had a lump in my throat the size of a golf ball, my tummy hurt and my eyes felt like swimming pools. If I truly took my third step, and was sincere in six and seven, I knew what I had to do. It was clear. I didn't need time to consider. I was ready to start making amends with AA.

Since that day, I have probably studied every piece of our literature. Our history, even started an "AA Comes Of Age" book study at my house. I've taken the time to take many people through the Traditions, and passing on what was so freely shown to me in our 2nd Legacy. Now I am in general service, doing the behind the scenes work that allows other members to carry the message.

I'm not popular today in my local fellowship. In fact, not only do I not have many "friends", some around here don't care for me. It can be a lonely place standing up for what's right in AA. I just have to remind myself that I can't take it personally and to continue to remember being new to AA and feeling the way I felt about those in the role I now have. I avoided them. Again, It's not the role I would have chosen for myself, but I don't get to be the director anymore. I get to play the role he assigns me.

I do have friends in AA. They are the other AA geeks. I get to see them at assemblies, conferences, workshops and other events.

I'm no-longer behind the podium all the time, but when I am, it's to talk about the Traditions and the mistakes I've made in AA. I still have to be conscious and mindful all the time about ego feeding propositions when it comes to how I serve in Alcoholics Anonymous. I am a committed member of my home group. I don't have to take service positions at other groups because "I'm so needed" — I try my best not to make exceptions for myself. To remember my case is not different. I am one among many.

We all have strengths and weaknesses, and even circumstances (which could even include our career choices) that put us where we fit. (Or keep us out of the positions that are possibly a better fit for someone NOT in those circumstances) I just need to remember that Self Sacrifice and Anonymity are what the Twelve Traditions repeatedly asks of me. Sacrificing personal ambition for the common good.

It really is a beautiful design. It takes all of us doing our own individual part, as one among many

for this beautiful AA puzzle to come together.

Share experiences that would relate to the "young" alcoholic who has yet to come to A.A.


BE CREATIVE AND HAVE FUN!

"Let us reemphasize that this reluctance to fight one another or anybody else is not counted as some special virtue which makes us feel superior to other people. Nor does it mean that the members of Alcoholics Anonymous, now restored as citizens of the world, are going to back away from their individual responsibilities to act as they see the right upon issues of our time. But when it comes to A.A. as a whole, that's quite a different matter. In this respect, we do not enter into public controversy, because we know that our Society will perish if it does. We conceive the survival and spread of Alcoholics Anonymous to be something of far greater importance than the weight we could collectively throw back of any other cause. Since recovery from alcoholism is life itself to us, it is imperative that we preserve in full strength our means of survival."

- 6. Do I breach this or any of its supporting Traditions in subtle, perhaps unconscious, ways?
- 7. How can I manifest the spirit of this Tradition in my personal life outside AA? Inside AA?




