Concept 4—Short Form

FOURTH STEP PRAYER

Dear God, it is I who has made my life a mess. I have done it, but I cannot undo it. My mistakes are mine and I will begin a searching and fearless moral inventory. I will write down my wrongs. But I will also include that which is good. I pray for the strength to complete this task.





Step Four: "Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves."

"We thought 'conditions' drove us to drink, and when we tried to correct these conditions and found that we couldn't to our entire satisfaction, our drinking went out of hand and we became alcoholics. It never occurred to us that we needed to change ourselves to meet conditions, whatever they were. But in A.A. we slowly learned that something had to be done about our vengeful resentments, self-pity, and unwarranted pride. We had to see that every time we played the big shot, we turned people against us. We had to see that when we harbored grudges and planned revenge for such defeats, we were really beating ourselves with the club of anger we had intended to use on others. We learned that if we were seriously disturbed, our *first* need was to quiet that disturbance, regardless of who or what we thought caused it."

The trustees Literature Committee is seeking stories from AA members with diverse backgrounds. This is in response to the 2022 Conference Advisory Action that the trustees' Literature Committee revise the pamphlet "Do You Think You're Different?" to update the stories to represent greater diversity.

The Trustees' Literature Committee requested that consideration be given to stories from multicultural populations, stories from A.A. members whose experience reflects multiple factors, and from diverse populations not addressed in other current A.A. literature.

Please encourage members in your area to write their personal stories for possible inclusion in the revised pamphlet "Do You Think You're Different." Stories should reflect "in a general way what we used to be like, what happened, and what we are like now."

The suggested format for typed manuscripts is 500-800 words, double spaced, in 12-point font. Handwritten manuscripts should be approximately 5 to 6 pages.

Please include your complete name, address, and email/phone information on the first page of your manuscript. A copy of your manuscript should be retained for your files.

The anonymity of all authors will be observed whether their story is selected for publication or not.



"The Opportunity To Do Better" ~ Carrie B. ~ April 2024 Grapevine

When I was new to AA, one of my favorite meetings to attend was a Tuesday night women's meeting. It wasn't my home group, but it was one of my favorite meetings. It was a closed meeting, but they allowed me to bring my 4year-old daughter with me. They had a group conscience to allow children. I told my sponsor all about this meeting and how much I liked it. When I got six months of sobriety, it happened to be on a Tuesday. My sponsor came with me to this women's meeting to give me my six-month coin. Because it was her first time visiting this meeting, I asked her afterward how she liked it. She said it seemed like a nice meeting, but she looked a little bit confused. She asked me if she had heard right when they were reading the script and said that the meeting was closed. I confirmed that, yes, that was one of the reasons I felt comfortable in the meeting. Then she asked why I was bringing my daughter to a closed meeting. I explained to her that they allow everyone to bring their kids and that it was a group conscience decision made by the members. That's when I first learned a lot more about Tradition Four. My sponsor took the time that evening to explain to me what a closed meeting is for. She explained that even though I don't personally choose to hide my anonymity, there are some members who need their anonymity to be protected. Some professionals can't risk running into their patients or clients. School teachers, pediatricians and counselors, among others, may actually need that meeting to be closed. And while I'm free to attend any meeting I like—open or closed—some members are only able to attend closed meetings. They depend on being able to look for that word "closed" in the AA meeting directory, knowing their anonymity will be protected. My sponsor told me that I don't have the right to risk someone else's anonymity by bringing my daughter to a closed meeting, no matter what their group conscience says. She explained that in our "Twelve and Twelve" book, in the Chapter about Tradition Four, it states that every group has the "right to be wrong," and in this case she thought the group was wrong. She told me that once I know better I have the opportunity to do better, just like in any other inventory work. More is always revealed. I stopped attending that meeting on the nights that I had my daughter. Coincidentally, my daughter started school the very next year, and you'll never guess how she knew the in-training principal. Yes, from the "closed" women's meeting. I felt terrible, but the principal was very gracious and understanding. Since then, I have a much deeper respect for all the Traditions. I also have a better understanding of the Fourth Tradition in that it was never intended to be used to void any of the other Traditions. The Traditions were meant to work together in unity, not against each other. One Tradition doesn't cancel another one out. Each group is autonomous *in their own customs and practices,* not their own Steps and Traditions. Does the group want to clap or chant? Should the meeting be an hour or an hour and a half long? How much money should the group keep for a prudent reserve? Does the group give out coins at the beginning of the meeting or the end of the meeting or not at all? Each group should have their own formats and their own customs. But the 12 Traditions are the same for every group. And if my home group is breaking a Tradition, we are affecting AA as a whole, because that's what we're passing on to new people—our future Oldtimers.


